Part 1. In-Text Citations

<u>Purpose of the in-text citation</u>: Use whenever you summarize, paraphrase, or quote from another source. The in-text citation directs the reader to the matching citation on the References page so that the reader can examine and look up that source.

In-text citations include the author's last name(s) and year of publication. Page number(s) are included for direct quotes. For sources without page numbers (such as websites and e-books), use a paragraph number and/or section heading instead.

Examples of In-Text Citations	
Type of In-Text Citation	Sample In-Text Citation
Single Author, direct quote (with an author signal phrase):	Skip Downing (2017) notes, "In order to create strong neural networks, you've got to actively participate in the learning process" (p. 262).
Single Author, paraphrase (with no author signal phrase):	There are more than 320 species of hummingbirds, which range in size from two to six inches long (Bruning, 2016).
Two Authors (always cite both names):	(Smith & Jones, 1972)
Three to five authors* (cite all authors the first time reference is used, after that, list first author's name followed by "et al."):	First time used: (Smith, Jones, Hanover, & Riley, 1984) Following citations: (Smith et al., 1984) *For six or more authors, cite name of first author with "et al.": (Smith et al., 1984)
Groups as authors (corporations, associations, government agencies, etc.; can be abbreviated after first citation):	First time used: (American Library Association, 2014) Following citations: (ALA, 2014)
Unknown or anonymous author (cite the first few words of the reference list title and year):	Use double quotation marks for an article, chapter, or web page: ("Study Finds," 2009) Italicize the title of a periodical, book, brochure, or report: (Gun Control, 2016)

- To cite specific parts of a source, indicate page, paragraph, chapter, figure or table after the date with a comma in-between
- For more in-text citation examples, see APA Publication Manual, sections 6.11 through 6.21

Part 2: Citations for References Page

- For every in-text citation included in your paper, you must have a corresponding **bibliographic citation** in the References page.
- Your **References** page should appear as the last page(s) of your essay or research paper.
- While the examples below are shown single-spaced, APA reference citations are always 1) double-spaced, 2) in alphabetical order, 3) with a half-inch (5 spaces) hanging indent format, and 4) one space following each period.
- The following are the formats and examples of common APA citations. Use these as guidelines to help cite your own sources.

1. Citing a Print Book	
Basic Formats:	Author, A. A. (Year Published). <i>Title of work: Subtitle</i> . Location: Publisher. or Editor, A. A. (Ed.). (Year Published). <i>Title of work: Subtitle</i> . Location: Publisher.
Example with one author:	Shotton, M. A. (1989). Computer addiction: A study of computer dependency. London, England: Taylor & Francis.

Example with two authors:	Forgan, J. W., & Richey, M. A. (2015). The impulsive, disorganized child: Solutions for parenting kids with executive functioning difficulties. Austin, TX: Prufrock Press.
Example with three or more authors:	Alper, S., Schloss, P. J., Etscheidt, S. K., & Macfarlane, C. A. (1995). <i>Inclusion: Are we abandoning or helping students?</i> Thousand Oaks, CA: Corwin Press.
Example with group author (corporations, associations, government agencies, etc.):	American Medical Association. (2004). <i>American Medical Association family medical guide</i> (4 th ed.). Hoboken, NJ: Wiley. Note: example also indicates edition other than first.
Example of edited work or collection with author:	Plath, S. (2000). The unabridged journals. K. V. Kukil (Ed.). New York, NY: Anchor.
Example of edited work or collection without author:	Duncan, G. J., & Brooks-Gunn, J. (Eds.). (1997). Consequences of growing up poor. New York, NY: Russell Sage Foundation.
Example of book translation:	Tolstoy, L. (2006). <i>War and peace</i> . (A. Briggs, Trans.). New York, NY: Viking. (Original Work published 1965).

2. Citing an eBook	
Basic Format:	Author, A. A. (Year Published). <i>Title of work</i> . Retrieved from http://xxxxxx, name of online/library database, or DOI number.
eBook from a library database:	Kirk, R. (2017). <i>Robots, Zombies and Us: Understanding Consciousness</i> . Retrieved from eBook Collection (EBSCOhost).
eBook available online:	Post, E. (1923). <i>Etiquette in society, in business, in politics, and at home</i> . New York, NY: Funk & Wagnalls. Retrieved from http://www.bartleby.com/95/
eBook purchased for E-Reader (such as Kindle):	Tetlock, P. E., & Gardner, D. (2015). Superforecasting: The art and science of prediction [Kindle version]. Retrieved from Amazon.com

3. Citing a chapter or entry from a Print Book or eBook	
Basic Formats:	Print: Author, A. A. (Year Published). Title of chapter or entry. In A. Editor (Ed.), Title of book (xx ed., Vol. xx, pp. xxx-xxx). Location: Publisher. Electronic: Author, A. A. (Year Published). Title of chapter or entry. In A. Editor (Ed.), Title of book (xx ed., Vol. xx, pp. xxx-xxx). Retrieved from http://xxxxxx, name of database, or DOI number

Basic Format:	Author, A. A. (Year, Date Published). Title of article. <i>Title of Periodical, Volume</i> (Issue no. if available), Pages xx-xx (p./pp. included for newspapers). doi:xx.xx (for journals, if assigned)
Monthly Print Magazine Article:	Chamberlin, J., Novotney, A., Packard, E., Price, M. (2008, May). Enhancing worker well-Being: Occupational health psychologists convene to share their research on work, stress, and health. <i>Monitor on Psychology</i> , <i>39</i> (5), 26-29.
Daily Print Newspaper Article:	Schwartz, J. (1993, September 30). Obesity affects economic, social status. <i>The Washington Post</i> , pp. A1, A4

5. Citing an Article from a Library Database or Website	
Basic Format:	Author, A. A. (Year, Date Published). Title of article. <i>Title of Periodical, Volume</i> (Issue no. if available), Pages. DOI number or Retrieved from URL/description of publisher.
Magazine article from source's website:	Clay, R. (2008, June). Science vs. ideology: Psychologists fight back about the misuse of research. <i>Monitor on Psychology</i> , <i>39</i> (6). Retrieved from http://www.apa.org/monitor/
Magazine article from library database:	Neumann, E. (2016, March-April). The kitchen sink: Can you farm carbon? <i>Mother Jones</i> , <i>41</i> (2), 64. Retrieved from Gale Opposing Viewpoints in Context

Basic Format:	Author, A. A. or Organization. (Year, Date Published). <i>Title of page/document</i> . Retrieved from http://xxxxxxx
Web Page with author:	Kraizer, S. (2011). <i>Safety on the Internet</i> . Retrieved from http://safechild.org/categoryparents/safety-on-the-internet/
Web Page with group author/organization:	American Cancer Society. (2015). <i>Genetics and cancer</i> . Retrieved from http://www.cancer.org/cancer/cancercauses/eneticsandcancer/index
Web Page with no author/date:	Scientific method. (n.d.). Retrieved August 21, 2016 from http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Scientific_method

Part 3: Formatting Guidelines

- APA formatting requirements include: A) 1" margins on all sides, B) double spaced, 12 pt Times New Roman text, with C) headers on all pages (short title of paper in caps aligned left; page number aligned right). The text Running head: is included on the first page only (before the title).
- The four major paper sections are: Title Page, Abstract, Main Body, and References (see the following examples):
